Idioms:

Dive into something

- *Definition:* To start doing something enthusiastically and with great energy.
- *Example sentences:*

Get your foot in the door

- *Definition:* To establish a initial presence or position that allows for further opportunities or progress.

 - "She volunteered to help with the event planning to get her foot in the door and network with industry professionals."

Hit the ground running

- *Definition:* To start something with great energy, effort, and efficiency, immediately upon beginning.
